Best Story Ever: 4. Exodus (Exodus 12-14)

Text questions

- 1. According to 12:1-13, what had to happen for a person to avoid God's judgment? Name as many specifics from the text as you can.
- 2. Speaking of God, Psalm 76:10 says, "Human defiance only enhances your glory, for you use it as a weapon." How is Pharaoh an example of this verse?
- 3. Read 14:1-4, 10-12. Then answer the following questions, being sure to cite one or more verses to support your response.
 - a. What command does God give the Israelites?
 - b. What does God say Pharaoh will conclude?
 - c. What do the Israelites conclude is God's reason for having them camp in a place where they'll be cornered by the Red Sea?
 - d. According to God what is the actual reason?
- 4. Despite having just seen God supernaturally free them from the greatest military power on the earth at that time, the Israelites doubt He can part the Red Sea (14:11-12)—and still God saves them anyway. What does this say about God's heart? About the nature of doubt?
- 5. Where do you see Jesus in this passage?

Life questions

- 1. Author C. H. Mackintosh notes that the Israelites were saved simply by having the blood on their doorpost—not whether their faith in that blood felt weak or strong.¹ Does your everyday peace tend to come from your performance as a Christian (how strong your faith is, how fruitful your life is, whether you're feeling the right feelings, etc.) or Christ's work on your behalf?
- 2. Exodus is a salvation story. If you're a believer, how did God's salvation change you? If you're not a believer, how do you think your life might change if you were to become a Christian?
- 3. God let the Israelites be cornered at the Red Sea (14:1-3). In your life, how have you seen God show you His glory through taking you to the end of yourself?
